Plans are well underway to control rabbits on Mt Majura, Mt Ainslie and the Watson woodland. Parks, Conservation and Lands will employ contractors from February 2009 onwards. Knowing where the warrens are would be very helpful. You can help mapping rabbit warrens! Rangers will be on site to demonstrate what to look for this Thursday at the Majura horse paddocks. There will be also an introduction in the use of a GPS device to record the positions of warrens. Please contact Liese (details below) even if you can't come to the meeting but could walk an area and record warrens before February 2009. We need to know roughly how many volunteers would participate in mapping.

We will once again join forces with the Mt Ainslie Weeders for a working party around the Ainslie tip site on Sunday 7 December. Come early for morning tea and receive your ParkCare volunteer shirt, hat and water bottle. Does anyone know about the whereabouts of 3 buckets (2 blue & 1 red) lost at our last working bee?

December and January is a challenging time for volunteers however that is exactly the time when many species of native plants seed. If you can, come along for a walk to collect seeds of mid storey shrubs (see details below). The seeds will be for the Greening Australia "Seeds for Survival" program in exchange for raising seedlings for FoMM projects.

ParkCare will celebrate a busy year with a Christmas party and BBQ on Wednesday 10 December - a great opportunity to meet members of other ParkCare groups. Everyone is welcome. Please rsvp (details below).

Unfortunately there was again an incident of illegal trapping at the Majura dams. A Hackett resident found traps, netting and a dead tortoise at the lower dam. Rangers have removed the trapping equipment. If you visit the dams and find traps please contact the Mitchell rangers at 6207 2113.
